# An Accessible Family Legacy

***Family collections hold relationships, memories, and stories — but scale, condition, and context can obscure them.***

# When a Collection Feels Overwhelming

Family collections hold relationships, memories, and stories — but they are often large, fragile, and undocumented. Boxes of letters and photos sit in basements, closets, and storage units, and their sheer size, condition, and lack of context can make them feel impossible to approach.

## Size and scale

Decades of letters, photos, and documents accumulate into volumes far too large to sort through by hand.

## Missing context

Names, dates, and connections fade over time, leaving materials without the story that once tied them together.

## Hard to prioritize

Without guidance, it is difficult to know which items are significant and where to begin the work.

## Privacy concerns

Families worry about who will handle sensitive family information and how it will be protected.

# We Begin With People, Not Boxes

The best teacher I have ever had taught geometry in high school. She was precise, definite and unmistakably clear in every detail. Even her appearance seemed to accentuate these points. ### Scattered Materials, Handled
